Sewer Capacity Study & Master Plan

A study was conducted by the City Engineers to determine if the current collection & conveyance system can handle the additional flows for future land development. Some upgrades were recommended on a two year schedule. The cost for maximum build out improvements is estimated to be \$1.6 million. Beginning January 1, 2014, the <u>quarterly trash rate</u> will increase to \$51.76 to cover the rate increase included in the waste hauler's contract.

Paving Program for 2013

Portions of Dickerson and Simmons Streets will be paved for the 2013 Street Paving Program. There will be some drainage improvements made in the area as well. The street program for 2013 has been awarded to Jerry's Paving with the low bid of \$169,392.50.

The City is currently working on updating the paving priority list based on street condition. Streets in poor condition are a higher priority for paving.

Impact Fee Study

The City has established water & sewer impact fees so that the cost of new development is borne by those causing the need for increased services & not by the citizens currently paying for services. The current rate payers have already paid for the infrastructure they require.

The current impact fees have been in place for over five years, and there have been significant changes made to our operations and capital plans to warrant an updated study. It will provide a fair basis for setting a new rate for impact fees.
