Summer Travel Safety Tips from the Harrington Police Department

Here are a few things to keep in mind if you will be traveling this summer:



- <u>Don't use your back pockets</u>. Pickpockets can easily lift your wallet from your back pocket.
- 2. <u>Hide your cash.</u> Don't carry all your cash in the same place. Hide it in several places when traveling.
- 3. <u>Fill out a house watch form.</u> Stop by HPD or get one from our webpage. Officers will check on your property while you're away. Also let a trusted neighbor know that you will be away.
- 4. <u>Don't post on social media.</u> Wait until you return from vacation to post about it on social media. Don't give criminals a heads up that you are not home.
- 5. <u>Leave a light on.</u> Put a light on a timer so that your house isn't completely dark.
- Stop your mail and newspaper. Have the post office hold your mail and stop your newspaper delivery or ask a neighbor to get them. Newspapers and mail piling up outside is a sure sign that no one is home.

Library Update The construction of a new library has taken a backseat to the lagoon closure, which is an expensive project with an environmental component that DNREC oversees, but the project

has reached some milestones. After a needs assessment was completed, a building was designed and a site was purchased. Progress has been made on designing and funding an entrance to the site. The Mayor and Council have instructed the City Manager to look into seeking permission from the Council on Libraries to build a smaller library than initially proposed in an effort to save money now and with the intention of expanding the building in the future.

Protecting our state's precious water begins with you...

Storm drains and roadside ditches lead directly to our streams, rivers, lakes and bays. So, any pollutants like oil, pet waste, leaves, grass clippings, trash, or dirty water from washing your car, or other outside activities that enter a storm drain eventually get into our state's precious waters.

As temperatures heat up outside, remember that it is very dangerous to

leave a child or animal unattended in a car. The inside of cars quickly get

very hot. Don't ever leave kids or pets in a car, even for a minute.

How can You help? Follow these Simple Tips to help keep our water clean.

- Never dump anything down a storm drain.
- Keep grass clippings off of sidewalks and streets.
- Use fertilizers and pesticides sparingly and sweep up any excess.
- Check your car for leaks, and recycle used motor oil.
- Take your car to a car wash, instead of washing it in your driveway.
- Pick up after your pet.
- Compost your yard waste.
